Visit to Community Grant recipient SCEAP

Staffordshire and Cheshire Equine Assisted Psychotherapy (SCEAP) is based on the outskirts of Stoke-on-Trent, at Great Eaves Farm in Bucknall. During the visit to the farm, it was clear to see the calming affects that the location can have on visitors before even stepping into the therapy space or meeting the animals.

SCEAP is a recent recipient of the second round of Community Mental Health Transformation Programme grants, delivered in partnership between North Staffordshire Combined Healthcare NHS Trust and Midlands Partnership University NHS Foundation Trust and The Community Foundation. The Community Interest Company (CIC) offers counselling and equine psychotherapy to members of Stoke-on-Trent and the wider community who might benefit from therapeutic support for a variety of issues.



The grant will allow SCEAP to provide free therapy sessions for those who are referred. Maggie Falconer Drew-Taylor is an Equine Facilitated Psychotherapist who facilitates the therapy at the farm, with help from her therapy herd of 6 horses. She has been working at SCEAP for six years and has seen the benefits of equine therapy for the visitors who she works with. As part of her work in partnership with Combined Healthcare, Maggie will partner with the Preparing for Adulthood team at the Trust, offering service users aged 16-18 years old who are living with mental illness the opportunity to have one-to-one or group sessions with Maggie and the therapy herd to support them with coping strategies and ways of dealing with their mental health issues. The therapy for the young adults is also a way to support the family of the individual, through involving family members in deciding the best ways to support their young adult as well as running a support group for the parents and carers of the young people.

The restorative power of “green social prescribing” - Latest episode of the Community Mental Health Transformation podcast




Co-production logo shortlist voting now open




Recast exhibition – Community Grant recipient

British Ceramics Biennial (BCB) are an organisation based in Stoke-on-Trent who are a grant recipient of the first round of the Community Mental Health Transformation programme grants. The first grant round was focussed on providing funding to community and voluntary groups who support adults with severe mental illness and was awarded in September 2022.

With the funding awarded, British Ceramics Biennial were able to cover 50% of project costs in order to continue with the Recast programme which was specifically designed to support those recovering from drug and alcohol addiction and run in partnership between the British Ceramics Biennial and the Stoke Recovery Service. The programme was made up of 8 weeks of clay workshops and culminated in an exhibition in central Hanley in June 2023.



The Recast exhibition took place at the AirSpace gallery and at the centre of the exhibition were works inspired by the theme of 'growth' which were made during a four-day residence at Spode Works. A selection of the Serenity Gardens created as part of the project can be seen pictured below, as well as a range of other pieces created at Recast's weekly workshops, documentary photographs and a newly commissioned film about the process by acclaimed filmmaker Thomas Payton Green.



Jo Mills, BCB Studio and Community Programme Manager comments: "We have found clay and ceramic processes to be rich territory for exploring addiction recovery. Coming together in a group to try new things, make a mess, forget about day-to-day life and connect with creativity has been invaluable for our Recast participants. It's wonderful to be able to share all this work with the public, and we hope that in doing so we'll contribute to a more positive narrative around addiction recovery."

Bex Stubbs, Project Manager for the Transformation Management Office, attended the event on behalf of North Staffordshire Combined Healthcare NHS Trust and said "Recast is a wonderful example of the positive impact community grant funding can have in our local community and what projects like this can help people achieve. The exhibition was a brilliant opportunity to see the results of participants work show cased for all to see. It was lovely to read some of the meanings behind the pieces and to share in such a special occasion. As a Trust we are excited to see what comes next as the project continues."

Wayne, Recast participant, comments: "You can evolve. Every time you come, you're doing something different. You're thinking different as well."

The Recast project was part funded by The Community Foundation as part of the Community Mental Health Transformation Programme round one grants supported by North Staffordshire Combined Healthcare NHS Trust and Midlands Partnership University NHS Foundation Trust.
